s the Reno-Tahoe housing market braces for potentially higher interest rates, area experts remain optimistic that home buyers and sellers can be successful in the market. 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Interesting Interest Rates

Kevin Jepsen, loan officer with Omega Mortgage Group in Reno, acknowledges March is a big month for the mortgage industry.

"This marks the rollout for the Federal Reserve to raise interest rates to combat inflation," he says. "It's even more important for buyers moving forward to take the time to make sure their finances are in order. See what debt you can alleviate before buying a home, and be prepared to make slightly higher payments, but this change is no reason to panic."

Last year around this time, Betsy Caron, Realtor with Berkshire Hathaway HomeServices Drysdale Properties in Sparks, received a call from a couple who wanted to buy a home but had bad credit. She urged them to call a trusted lender and get to work. The couple closed on their new house this January.

"I'm in it for the long haul," Caron says. "It's always good to work with your real estate agent and the lender as a team. People get nervous to talk with a lender, but you really should do so at least three to six months before you want to buy to make sure everything is in order when you make an offer."

Karen Walker Hill, residential specialist at Ferrari-Lund Real Estate in Reno, echoes the sentiment, adding the Reno/Tahoe still is a seller's market.



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"Spring is the perfect time to sell your home because people are thinking it's the end of the school year, and they want to relocate before summer. Plus, flowers are coming up, and it makes everything show so pretty. Inventory is at an all-time low. It's easy peasy right now to be a seller — you're the belle of the ball and can expect multiple offers and overbids."

Power Precautions

American homes are using more power than ever before. Smartphones, smart devices, and all of the modern conveniences that have become part of life increase demand on the home's electrical system. Joseph Kruse, project manager with EVO Electric in Reno, encourages homeowners to be aware of the additional burden being placed on the home.



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


Look at LEDs

Gone are the days of halogen and incandescent lighting. Bring on the LEDs. Sam Olson, team lead/ owner of The Olson Group of RE/MAX Realty Affiliates in Reno, explains, "When they're done right, they are fantastic. If they're the cool blue color, they are really sterile and really bad."

Olson recommends considering flush-mount ceiling lights and replacing old bulbs with LED technology, but with one key tip.

"Be sure to get warm tones like warm yellow," he says. "The LEDs are so much better now, and the cost has come down significantly. Be mindful of your lighting plan in your home and add warm, welcoming hues."





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Quartz Countertops

Evan Petty, manager of Majestic Marble & Tile in Carson City, continues to notice a big demand for quartz countertops, because of both the ease of caring for them and the color schemes available in the engineered material.

"The gray tones and marble look, with gray and white, are really popular. People like the honed or polished look, and quartz is maintenance free, so you don't have to seal it. It's a great option," Petty says.

In addition, he suggests using a different statement countertop on a center island meant for entertaining and seating; then keep the perimeter of the kitchen topped with something more low key.

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
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Bring the Outside In
